Transport

The venue is situated just a few minutes from the M42 motorway, approximately 3 miles from Birmingham International Airport and rail station, and quarter of a mile from Solihull rail station.

By car: Leave the M42 from junction five and head onto the A41 Solihull Bypass. On reaching the slip road bear left heading for Solihull town centre on the A4025. When you come to the roundabout continue on the A4025 by leaving at the second exit, then continue forward at the subsequent three sets of traffic lights. At the next roundabout take the second exit and you will come to the St John's Hotel on your right.

By train: Trains to Solihull station run frequently from Birmingham Moor Street station, a quarter mile walk from Birmingham New Street. Alternatively from New Street there are frequent trains to Birmingham International Airport station, about 3 miles from the venue.
